Just 15 minutes a day...

Advent is upon us, and so are the multitude of reflections, books and essays on it. As the beginning of our new church year, as well as the season leading up to our Lord's birth, the richness of this season cannot be understated, and I encourage each of you to add a reflection on Advent to your daily routine.

While I, myself, was initially tempted to write a reflection on Advent, I was instead drawn to writing about what has been frequently referred to as our weapon of choice: the rosary. As Knights, we each receive a rosary as part of our induction—and for good reason. For hundreds of years - through saints, mystics and by our Blessed Mother herself — we have been encouraged and urged to pray the rosary. This enduring and distinctive representation of our Catholic faith is more than just a symbol. With discipline, like any healthy habit, praying it brings us closer to Jesus himself — and serves to cultivate our roles as men.

Like so much of our Catholic faith, our communion with God involves every aspect of our being. Our body and spirit are intertwined – which is why we cannot just leave our spirituality just for the Mass. We must actually live our faith out every moment of the day. The humble rosary is a gentle yet powerful reminder of that. As Archbishop Fulton Sheen said, the rosary "involves the simultaneous use of three powers: the physical, the vocal, and the spiritual, and in that order." In it, we

verbally pray. mentally reflect and physically respond (through the rosary beads in our hands) to the entirety of Jesus' everlasting presence, while invokina our Blessed Mother.



The origins of the rosary are hard to pinpoint. Like many religious traditions, it is believed that beads were used by illiterate, lay religious brothers to keep track of commonly used prayers (remember that for most of history, mankind's most of humanity illiterate). Tradition holds that around the 12th century, St. Dominic evangelized and institutionalized the rosary in the recognizable form which we use to this day. Its popularity as a devotion increased dramatically in the 1500s - around the period that the Muslim Turks were attempting to conquer Europe. In the battle of Lepanto in 1571 - which is still frequently viewed by historians as one of the great turning points in Western history the praying of the rosary played a prominent role. Indeed, Pope Pius V instituted the feast of "Our Lady of Victory" because of the naval victory of Lepanto.

I urge every one of my brother Knights to start or keep on praying the rosary every day. It's 15-20 minutes of your day that will create fruits in this life and beyond.

As another tumultuous year wraps up, Advent has arrived to help remind us of the many blessings in our lives. While we will undoubtedly get bombarded with advertisements urging us to focus on the

material aspects of the holiday season, it is important for us to keep the true spirt of Christmas alive in our homes, schools, communities and parishes. A Christmas Gift: Life Insurance

A recent survey from LIMRA (Life Insurance Marketing Research Association) found that only 59% of Americans own life insurance and about half of those are underinsured.

So what does that have to do with the Knights? The historian, Christopher Kauffman, spent several years at the Supreme Office and at the Museum, researching the book that he wrote on the 100th anniversary of our founding. That book, <u>Faith and Fraternalism</u>, notes on page 13, "...he [Fr. McGivney] was deeply interested in pursuing the topic of a Catholic fraternal insurance society among groups of Catholic laymen of New Haven." Then on page 35 Mr. Kauffman goes on, "...he [Fr. McGivney again] spent his energy in promoting the insurance feature...his emphasis on business was his pastoral concern for the social and financial security of the family."

Blessed Fr. McGivney lived both the social and the financial *insecurity* of a desperate family, with the breadwinner suddenly taken, that had to be supported. He left the seminary to work and support his mother and siblings. He didn't want other Catholic families to find themselves in such a predicament. That, and uniting men of faith, was the impetus for establishing our Order. Everyone who joined in those first years was insured; that was part and parcel of being in the organization. Now every member has a choice, and every member should know what we do, and how we do it.

I don't know about you, but I don't want to buy life insurance...I want to buy what life insurance provides: no change in lifestyle for the survivors... in the house where they want to be. It'll pay for a daughter's wedding, a child's college education and much more.

What does life insurance provide? Peace of mind, security, freedom from anxiety, a safeguard from the unknown—that's where I can help.


