Celebrate the Feast of Saint John Paul II

In honor of our Council's namesake, and this beloved saint's feast day - October 22nd

On October 12, 2012, the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments confirmed the inscription of Saint John

Paul II, Pope, into the Proper Calendar for the Dioceses of the United States of America. Two years later, on May 29, 2014, Pope Francis ordered the inscription of Saint John Paul II into the General Roman Calendar. St. John Paul is celebrated each year as an Optional Memorial on October 22nd. On September 21, 2019, the Congregation confirmed a definitive translation for future use, beginning in 2020. The proper liturgical texts in their final English version are provided below:

Roman Missal

From the Common of Pastors: For a Pope. Collect

O God, rich in mercy,

who willed that Pope Saint John Paul the Second should preside over your universal Church, grant, we pray, that instructed by his teaching, we may confidently open our hearts to the saving grace of Christ.

the sole Redeemer of the human race. Who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit.

one God, for ever and ever.

Lectionary for Mass

Aside from the usual Mass readings of the day, any Lectionary readings from the Common of Pastors: For a Pope may be used for St. John Paul II. The following readings from that Common, suggested by the Holy See, are also available in no. 663A of the Lectionary for Mass Supplement:

- First Reading Isaiah 52:7-10 All the ends of the earth will behold the salvation of our God.
- Responsorial Psalm Psalm 96:1-2a, 2b-3, 7-8a, 10
 R/. Proclaim God's marvelous deeds to all the nations.
- Gospel Acclamation John 10:14 I am the good shepherd, says the Lord, I know my sheep, and mine know me.
- ➤ Gospel John 21:15-17 Feed my lambs, feed my sheep.

Election Day Is Coming - Get Out and Vote



Tuesday, November 2nd, is Election Day. Knights are urged to exercise their civil right and vote in national, state and local elections. This begins by confirming your voter registration and, if not registered, to register, AND to encourage eligible family

members and friends to do the same. To assist members and their families, the Knights of Columbus maintains a dedicated webpage that contains resources to assist in confirming voter registration or to register to vote – kofc.org/vote.

Regrettably, not all citizens exercise this fundamental civil liberty, which so many have given so much to uphold throughout the history of our nation. Voter turnout rates have ranged from 50 to 60 percent in the past several years. In a year of uncertainty due to the pandemic, the turnout rate could be even lower. As patriotic Catholics, we are grateful to live in a country where we have the right to vote – and the freedom to encourage all those voters around us to vote as well. That is why the Knights of Columbus sponsors its "Nonpartisan National Get Out and Vote Program," which aims to increase voter participation in the electoral process.

Through this program, brother Knights can assist eligible voters who may lack access to the critical information necessary to ensure all may freely cast their ballot by referring them to nonpartisan resources available at kofc.org/vote - whether voting by mail, absentee ballot or at a polling place. Working together, brother Knights can make history by improving voter participation in their communities because *Every. Vote. Matters.*Learn more at kofc.org/vote.

The Four Cardinal Virtues: Justice

This month's featured virtue is actually much more complex than what we many of us may think. But, again, let's review all those Cardinal Virtues: Prudence, Justice, Fortitude and Temperance.

When we think of justice, we may often think of punishment or even vengeance. Images of a Marvel superhero may come to mind. While that may be a form of justice, it certainly is only one bit of its greater definition. We again turn toward the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) which defines justice as "the moral virtue that consists in the constant and firm will to give their due to God and neighbor." There are two parts to this that are interrelated.

In the first part, the just man gives his due to God. Indeed, this is captured in the Lord's prayer, where Jesus teaches us to pray "hallowed be thy name." But giving God what is His due goes beyond praising His name in prayer. Justice involves obligation and, as Catholics, we have an obligation to God to fulfill His designs for us. We are duty-bound not just to attend Sunday Mass but, in a much broader yet fundamental sense, live our lives doing our best to follow His will for us.

From that obligation to God comes our obligations to each other. To quote noted theologian Josef Pieper: "To be just means to recognize the other as other; it means to give acknowledgment even where one cannot love." Justice involves doing the tangible and observable good for the other and/or for the greater community. But in willing the good of the other — or, indeed, in doing what one thinks might be good for the other — it may involve correction, firm resolve and strong action.

St. Junipero Serra was a man who exemplified justice. As the Spanish colonized and moved into California in the mid-to-late 1700s, Junipero Serra volunteered to bring the good news of Christ to the native Indians. He established the California Mission system. He baptized and educated the natives. Most importantly, he recognized their God-given rights and fought for their proper treatment by the Spanish authorities – with whom he frequently clashed. Most famously, he made the arduous sea-and-land journey from California to Mexico City (opting to walk the 275 miles from the port to the capital) to demand a bill of rights for the natives in California. As Knights, let us always strive to apply our church's teaching of justice in all that we do.

First Anniversary of the Beatification of Fr. Michael McGivney



Blessed Father Michael J. McGivney's Beatification Mass took place last year on October 31st. The Mass took place in Connecticut and was televised worldwide. It included the reading of an apostolic letter from the Holy Father and the bestowing of the title "Blessed" on Father McGivney.

The miracle recognized as coming through Father McGivney's intercession involved an unborn child in the United States who in 2015 was healed in utero of a lifethreatening condition after prayers by his family to Father McGivney.

In an address to the Knights of Columbus Board of Directors, Pope Francis said the organization has been faithful "to the vision of your founder, Venerable Michael McGivney, who was inspired by the principles of Christian charity and fraternity to assist those most in need."

"Father McGivney has inspired generations of Catholic men to roll up their sleeves and put their faith into action," then, Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson said. "He was decades ahead of his time in giving the laity an important role within the Church. Today, his spirit continues to shape the extraordinary charitable work of Knights as they continue to serve those on the margins of society as he served widows and orphans in the 1880s. Father McGivney also remains an important role model for parish priests around the world and left us a transformative legacy of effective cooperation between the laity and clergy."

Known by his contemporaries for his devotion to the faith and his embodiment of the characteristics of the "Good Samaritan," his cause for sainthood was opened in the Archdiocese of Hartford in 1997. St. John Paul II – who was pope at that time – lauded Father McGivney's principles, stating in 2003, "In fidelity to the vision of Father McGivney, may you continue to seek new ways of being a leaven of the Gospel in the world and a spiritual force for the renewal of the Church in holiness, unity and truth."

In March 2008, he was declared a Venerable Servant of God by Pope Benedict XVI, who during his visit to St. Patrick's Cathedral cited the "remarkable accomplishment of that exemplary American priest, the Venerable Michael McGivney, whose vision and zeal led to the establishment of the Knights of Columbus."



As October is Respect Life Month, we thought we would sit down with major Pro-Life warrior Council 4522 member Sir Knight Larry Cirignano. We talked about his history, life, dedication, and all things pro-life.



Knightly News: Let's start with the basics. How did you get interested in the pro-life cause?

Sir Knight Larry Cirignano: I was raised Catholic, and it's always been there. I did campaigns and elections, and because I was the Catholic kid I always got picked to do the social stuff. I was running a governor's race in 1996 in Wheeling, WV for Dave McKinley who is now a congressman. Father [Frank] Pavone (https://www.priestsforlife.org/) came to town and did a 1-day seminar and I went to

meet the pro-lifers to recruit for the campaign. I got educated and built a lifetime friendship with [Fr. Pavone]. All the priests who work with him, they have all stayed at my house at one point or another when they come through Washington, as have countless other activists for the march for life and other forums and activities in DC. More and more I got involved here at Queen of Apostles. Father Walsh called a meeting and there were about 30 of us there, including the Mr. and Mrs. Moran. They asked for a volunteer and my hand sort of got raised for me.

KN: It happens...

LC: We started to do the research and found that we had the busiest abortion mill [in Northern Virginia] in the parish boundaries. Then we started with various activities. The Morans have been running a Rosary every 3rd Saturday [at the abortion mill] for at least 40 years now. We upped it and got some of the priests to do the Red Rose Rescues (https://www.redroserescue.com/) which got [the mill] thrown out of the building because nobody wanted to rent in a building that had an abortion area in it. They moved across the street so now we can do sidewalk counseling and A Best Choice (https://abestchoice.us/) can come with their mobile home and do the sonograms.

The Mount Vernon Knights found out about that through the diocese and helped A Best Choice raise the money for a new sonogram machine. The guy who represents the Mount Vernon Knights, Rich Hayden, has been there 80 Saturdays in a row with coffee, doughnuts and a tent. Slowly, but surely we're building a cadre of people to show up every Saturday. We now get between 30-50 people to show up.

KN: Just out of curiosity we have to ask, what is your nine to five job?

LC: I do political consulting, but I tell people I do whatever my "knee" mail (prayer) tells me to do.

KN: What sort of things do you do here on the local level?

LC: We've got the March for Life in Richmond [9/17], on Saturday [9/18] we have the memorial to the unborn who were found at buried at Turo Center. There are 227 babies that were found buried there. Eric Shiedler (https://prolifeaction.org/) runs the [pro-life banners from overpasses] and the Tradition Family and Property (https://prolifeaction.org/) run National rosaries for Fatima Anniversaries as well as rosaries for the police at different times—we try to plug in to these National [programs].

KN: In the past I have heard you mention the Choose Life (<u>www.choose-life.org</u>) license plates, and I know you sell the Choose Life ties...Is that statewide, could you tell me more about that?

LC: It's national...One of the [Q of A] priests said to the people from Florida who were coming up for a meeting in Washington "Call Larry, he'll get you a place to stay". They came and stayed, and I got recruited to be their DC guy. They were in Florida initially and have now expanded to 34 states and DC. There are only 12 people in D.C. who have a Choose Life license plate, (http://www.vachoose-life.org/) but it's on the road. If you don't want to say, "No Taxation without Representation", you can get the smiling kids' faces. The money in each state is different, but it goes through the department of motor vehicles to the pregnancy centers.

KN: And how much from each plate is making it through?

LC: In Virginia, you pay \$25 dollars plus \$10 if you want to have it personalized. In Virginia, it is set up with Heartbeat International figuring out who the pregnancy centers are and getting them the checks. Heartbeat International promotes the plates to their members, because there is no money for marketing or overhead. Over \$750,000 has been raised in Virginia. (https://www.dmv.virginia.gov/vehicles/#splates/info.asp?idnm=CL)

KN: If you could tell or ask our fellow Knights in the local area one thing they could do to help the pro-life movement, what would it be?

LC: Get the Choose Life license plate and the Pro-Life flag. Fly the colors at their council, their schools, their city hall, their church.

KN: How do people get the Choose Life flag?

LC: https://www.prolifeflag.com/

KN: Does [council 4522] have one?

LC: We just got it in the mail today. Worthy District Deputy John Knox ordered a bunch of bumper stickers and is promoting those.

KN: So in the end it's not always about money, it's about visibility.

LC: Right...A lot of pro-life supporters in the area work for the government and wouldn't' want to be seen at anything public. It's political as far as they see it. When David Daleiden did the video on Planned Parenthood we had a thousand people on the street in Falls Church. Six weeks later the Planned Parenthood in Falls Church closed because the landlord and the tenants didn't want it there anymore. That's what happened at Landmark Towers [the abortion mill in the Q of A boundaries] and we're hoping we can prevent these guys from moving someplace because where they go, we go, and a lot of landlords don't want to see that.

Rich [Hayden] and I are witnesses for those angry people who want to come yell. They can come yell at us. We can run the camera if anyone is being silly and call the police if that happens. It very seldom happens. More often than not, we offer help to women, and they at least take a pamphlet. If somebody calls the police on us, then they'll come over and have a muffin or a doughnut.

We had the police called on us in Falls Church when we were singing Christmas Carols. I know it's a crime when I sing so I asked if I could just hum. It turns out the law they were citing was for buskers [street performers]. They quickly figured out that didn't apply to us and our first amendment right to sing Christmas Carols to an empty manger. The next week, the police officer came out and sang with us.

KN: In all your years, what was the most impactful program or moment for you?

LC: You know, the Rosary Coast-to-Coast (https://rosarycoast.com/rosary-coast-to-coast-2021/) Sunday, October 10th at 2 PM To start, I did the 40 Days for Life (https://www.40daysforlife.com/en/) in front of the [US] Supreme Court and a friend of mine called me and said a friend of his wanted to do a Rosary rally at the Capitol and it turned out that two weeks earlier, a woman who was at 40 Days for Life had the same thought as we were standing in front of the Supreme Court, and said it would be great to have a bunch of people saying the Rosary at the Capitol. Fr. [Patrick] Peyton (https://www.fatherpeyton.org/) who was the Rosary priest out of Boston at one point had 50,000 people in San Francisco saying the Rosary.

St. Peter's on Capitol Hill has a picture of about 200 clerics and altar boys leading a procession...there have been some big events there. We are now in the sixth year. Last year Bishop Joseph Coffey of the Archdiocese of the Military led a procession from St. Peter's down to the front of the Capitol. That is pretty special you know...I mean the power of prayer.

We will be doing a balloon Rosary on **Saturday, October 16,** at Noon at 5999 Stevenson Ave. abortion mill. That usually has a big impact. I hope everyone can join us.

Probably the biggest God wink that we've gotten was the time the Bishop Burbidge and the kids from Christendom College came. Once a year the kids from Christendom come and say the Rosary at Planned Parenthood in D.C. or a local abortion mill. They happened to come [to the abortion mill at Landmark Towers] because the Bishop was coming. It turned out it was the same day they were closing Landmark Towers and moving across the street. So, while they were moving across the street, we had 150 people there and did a balloon Rosary.

KN: To send them off...

LC: Yeah...you can't make that up. [In the summer of 2021, I was alone with the cicadas, and ended up talking to a woman]...She didn't want to have an abortion, but her boyfriend was pressuring her. We sent her over to get a sonogram, and she came back with the picture all excited, 6 weeks [pregnant]. She went home to tell her mother, and the boyfriend was there. [She came back]...and had us call the Police, she didn't want to call the police on him. The cops went and talked to him, and a different set of cops came to talk to us. When she saw the cop, it was a guy she had gone to high school with. She just...you know...tear works. While she was there talking to the cop, the boyfriend walked up the hill [to the gas station across the street]...still drunk. He started berating her on the phone...and the cop said "You don't have to testify, I can tell everyone that's assault, I'm going to go arrest him." He went over and arrested the [boyfriend].

KN: It sounds like the local police have been very friendly and helpful with you guys?

LC: Pretty much. [Brother] Roger Bion was a coach of one of [the police officers]. Another one knows Rich and love's his wife's banana muffins. So that's kind of fun.

KN: Look into the future for us.

LC: It's changing the culture...we need to make abortion unthinkable.

KN: ...and the big question here is "Are we winning?"

LC: We're making significant impacts. The number of abortion mills [in Virginia] it is half and Nationwide it is down by 79% from 1992. The abortion numbers are coming down [but the reporting is imperfect and may be misleading]. In Ohio, they are leading the way in finding where the [babies'] bodies go and have required that there be a burial. We do not know where they are going in Virginia. [There are] 44 a day.


KN: Alright Brother Larry, end us on a high note here.

LC: On a high note, all the kids today started with a sonogram as their first picture. Many still have them on their refrigerator, and now it's in their baby book, and they understand that. Kids today are not getting pregnant as early as they used to or as often as they used to. There is a declining birthrate around the country. Obviously, the Texas law [prohibition of abortion after 6 weeks] leads us to believe that something could happen.


KN: That's got to be impressive right?

LC: True...They are saving 150 babies a day in Texas, every day that law stays in effect. Today the judge set the hearing for 2 weeks from now, and we know the Supreme Court didn't put a hold on it. We could go longer. We'll see—a lot of legislatures will pick up what Texas did and emulate them. Whether or not it will stand in court...we'll see. We see more people coming out to pray, and fewer people coming in for abortions.






